About Alex's Lemonade Stand

When Alex, who was diagnosed with childhood cancer just before her first birthday, was 4, she told her parents she wanted to set up a front yard lemonade stand. Her plan: to give the money to doctors to help them find a cure. Alex continued to set up lemonade stands every year. As news spread, people everywhere were inspired to start their own lemonade stands — donating the proceeds to her cause.

In 2004 when Alex passed away at the age of 8 — her stand and inspiration had raised more than \$1 million towards finding a cure. Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation (ALSF) was started by her parents in 2005.
